


Americans' Overall View of the "Federal Government"






Americans' View of Business Industry Sectors








Do You Think the Federal Government Today Has Too Much Power?






Do you think the federal government poses an immediate threat to the rights and freedoms of ordinary citizens, or not?







Do you think the federal government poses an immediate threat to the rights and freedoms of ordinary citizens, or not?







Americans' Views of "The Federal Government"






Do You Think the Federal Government Poses an Immediate Threat to the Rights and Responsibilities of Ordinary Citizens, or Not?







Highest percentage of males, Republicans, conservatives, non-Hispanic whites, most affluent, oldest

Mushy middle (17%)

Highest education levels, most independents


The bigger, the better (20%)

Majority female, highest percentage of non-whites, never-been-marrieds

Morality first (17%)


Most religious. Majority are 50 or older, Republican, conservative

Federal Government Responsibility for "Upholding Moral Standards"






Federal Government Responsibility for "Reducing Income Differences"






Federal Government Responsibility for "Protecting Americans from Foreign Threats"





Federal Government Responsibility for: "Making Sure All Americans Have Adequate Healthcare"



Federal Government Responsibility for "Providing a Minimum Standard of Living For All"







So, what have we learned so far?

- Like the cable company bad image, but necessary service
- Americans largely dissatisfied with government today, and want changes in process
- But widely varying support for government taking an active role in addressing most problems
- And some dissatisfaction has to do with federal inaction, not just too much action

So, what have we learned so far?

- So, what is to be done?
 - Recognize, regardless of who is in power, that Americans neither want no government nor total government
 - 2. Next Congress, be it Republican or Democrat, needs to consider tacking toward the middle
 - 3. If Republicans win control of Congress, could be at risk of overstepping, politically, just as Obama and the Democrats may have overstepped in the past two years in the other direction

- 4. Fix the federal government's brand image
- 5. Decide on how to improve process of providing services






Trust in Elected Representatives Versus People Themselves


Expected impact of a "<u>national referendum system</u> in which all citizens voted on proposals that deal with major national issues, before they became law"







Trust and Confidence in the Legislative Branch, consisting of the U.S. Senate and House of Representatives






Trust and Confidence in Federal Government to Handle Domestic Problems
