JFK Gets High Rating From Press Conference 'Audience'

Kennedy's Impromptu Handling Of Conference Impresses, But Some Question 'Live' Approach

PRINCETON, N. J., May 5—Highly impressed with the way President Kennedy handles himself at his press conferences, most Americans who have seen him in action recently like the impromptu atmosphere of the President's sessions with the press.

To a sizable minority of his nationwide "audience," however, these free-swinging conferences contain the pitfalls of "off-the-cuff diplomacy" where a chance remark by Kennedy might cause serious

They would prefer that the President only answer questions which have been submitted in writing one or two days in advance of a sched-uled press conference.

The spontaneous nature of to-day's televised Presidential press conference has led some observers to question the wisdom of having Chief Executive speak off-thecuff on any and all topics.

To see how the audience across the country is reacting to this, the Gallup Poll assigned its reporters to ask a series of questions concerning both Kennedy's perform-ance and the manner in which the press conferences are handled.

The survey finds that an estimated 78 million adults have seen or heard one or more of the Presi-dent's conferences during the last six months — or nearly three out of every four adults.

The consensus from this audience is overwhelming that Kennedy per-forms impressively in these sessions.

To the people across the country, he is projecting a favorable "image" of a forceful leader who is very well-informed and extremely capable in the verbal footwork of the press conference.

All of those in the survey who said they had seen or heard a con-ference in the last six months were


In commenting about the Kennedy performance, people say things like: "He never gets rattled." always knows the answers. "He handles it with dignity and
